
LETTER FROM LUIS PATRICIO, BOARD CHAIR

Mobility is a fundamental human right. As I get ready to apply for my Canadian Citizenship I learned that mobility is also one of the most important rights in the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms. As Canadians we should have the freedom to choose where we live and work.

Unfortunately, this is not true for many of us and the Coronavirus pandemic made that even more plain to see. <u>Mobility is a privilege.</u> Many of us don't have access to jobs, healthy food, green spaces, health care, entertainment and many other amenities our city has to offer. Not because we need to stay apart together but because some of us, for different reasons, don't have access to a private vehicle. Deprived of all those things, cyclists, pedestrians and bus riders are de facto second-class citizens. For many of us, this is not a choice. <u>Mobility inequality</u> intersects with other dimensions of inequality: ethnicity, gender, age, low-income and citizenship status.

A long term solution for this social crisis can only be achieved in conjunction with solutions for our <u>environmental and economic crises</u>. London declared a climate emergency and our number one source of pollution is GHG emissions from private vehicles. Oil/gas industries are facing a steady decline and their dependence on fluctuating global markets is a constant reminder that the sooner we shift our transportation away from fossil fuels the better. And with high unemployment rates, precarious jobs and the working poor class, prioritizing cars that cost an average of \$10,000 a year is ludicrous.

We can all agree that 2020 wasn't an easy year. On the bright side, we had the cleanest air all around the world in decades. People saw how interconnected our lives are. And the cycling boom once more showed how <u>bicycles are a resilient and affordable alternative</u> <u>aligned with the best future we can imagine</u>. We can get out of our cars without shutting down our economy, and many cities are already doing that. More importantly, a lot of people are willing to do that right here, right now.

We have made progress in the last few years but London Ontario bike mode share is still <u>1.4%</u>. It is urgent to make cycling a convenient and safe option for all ages. Making cycling a true priority would cost a fraction of our current transportation budget, strengthen our local economy, and make us healthier and happier. What are we waiting for?

Despite all the challenges the pandemic has thrown at us, Londoners are cycling more than ever! We know this will only be temporary unless they feel safe, supported and encouraged to keep riding - that's the inspiring work ahead of us.

It was an exciting year to expand our Squeaky Wheel operations by hiring Wyatt Pate as our shop manager and increasing our capacity with summer employees Lexy Majocha and Taylor Doyle. Our partnership with Big Bike Giveaway on Free Rides for Essential Workers won a Pillar Award, which we're very proud of!

This year also saw significant progress on safe cycling infrastructure. The TVP North Branch connection opened and the Dundas and Colborne cycle tracks will be opening very soon. Next year the progress will continue with an additional \$3.5M for cycling and walking from the Covid Resilience funding. Thanks to everyone who helped make this a reality!

CITY BUDGET

Our budget campaign asked for a 40km expansion of the safe cycling network in 4 years and a dedicated staff member at City Hall for cycling and walking.


RESULT: A 39KM PROPOSAL IS APPROVED AND AWAITING FUNDING & AN ACTIVE TRANSPORTATION MANAGER WILL BE HIRED IN EARLY 2021

SAFE ROUTES PROPOSAL

In response to the pandemic we worked collaboratively with many other community-members to propose what building-back-better would look like on our streets.

Our proposal was a 75-km minimum grid of quiet streets and protected bike lanes that would enable more jobs to be accessed, encourage recreation and foster active travel to school.

RESULT: \$3.5M FOR CYCLING IN 2021

ORGANIZATIONAL GROWTH

This year was a growth year in more ways than one. We secured a fouryear grant through the City of London Community Grants program that provides a source of stable revenue and supports our efforts to encourage cycling through education, events and by creating a welcoming hub.



We also increased our own revenues through increased sales at Squeaky Wheel and more memberships.
